




LUMPS AND BUMPS

are common in our aging pets. It is always best to let our veterinarians check lumps, no matter the size. Many are benign and nothing to worry about, but dogs can grow mast cell tumors that need to be surgically removed and it is much easier (and less expensive!) to get them off when they are small. Cats have a higher percentage of lumps that are cancerous, even though they may look small and “quiet.” If your pet has a lump or bump that hasn’t been checked, please schedule an appointment with us soon!

Meet Arvin, a 4 year old loveable pit bull mix. He is one of the sweetest dogs who loves his velvet head petted. Arvin was rescued as a young dog and found to have had obvious trauma to his right eye.

Before coming to Indian Trail Animal Hospital, Arvin had a malignant mast cell tumor surgically removed from a rear leg. When his owners found another mass along his jaw line, they brought him to us for examination. It was diagnosed as another malignant mast cell tumor and Arvin was scheduled for surgery. The mass lay very close to the jugular vein so great care was taken to remove it safely.

Fortunately, the laboratory reported that the entire mass had been excised and was curative for Arvin. This happy boy has made a full recovery and continues to bring smiles to everyone here when he visits!
